



NATIONAL LIBRARY WEEK

During National Library Week, we celebrated all our school librarians and library professionals in our public schools with a press release that highlighted two of our librarian members who say the stereotype of the quiet library is outdated.



Lee Calaman, a middle school librarian at Upper Perkiomen Middle School, believes that school libraries are powerful places. "We love that libraries have books our students can check out, but they also

serve as gathering places that help improve the community at large. We don't want people to keep believing that libraries are supposed to be this silent place – we want our library to be a lively center where people can come and enjoy the wide array of materials that are available."



Jenn Roth, an elementary librarian at North Wales Elementary School, agrees that the stereotype of quiet libraries is outdated. She works with students from kindergarten through sixth grade. She explains, "They're places where

students can use their imagination, work with a classmate, and feel like they belong somewhere. I want every child to have a welcoming library where they can find themselves in a book or engage in meaningful activities with friends."

ART SHOW

The 37th "Touch the Future" Art Show opened with an awards ceremony at Montgomery County Community College on March 3. This show was a professionally-juried art exhibit named in tribute to Christa McAuliffe, the first teacher in space who perished aboard the space shuttle Challenger in 1986 and was known to have said, "I touch the future. I teach."

There were **25 local high schools** participating in the show, which featured **301 student artworks**. The winners of the juried show have been selected by Em Kleaver, Admissions Counselor at Temple University's Tyler School of Art and Architecture. The 2024 show awarded **26 prizes totaling \$4,835**, which PSEA Mideastern Region CAPS sponsored alongside PSEA Montco-Retired.





SPELLING BEE



Students competed at Wissahickon High School on March 16. Spellers studied "Words of the Champions," the 4,000-word list provided by the Scripps National Spelling Bee, to prepare for the competition. **Indigo Satko, an 8**th **grader from Wissahickon Middle School**, is the champion of the Scripps Bucks-Mont regional spelling bee. His winning word was "neuropathy." The competition involved **thirty-three champions** from local schools, which ended after nine rounds. Indigo now advances to compete in the 2024 Scripps National Spelling Bee this summer near Washington, D.C. The semifinals on May 29 and the finals on May 30 will be televised on ION.
