Up to 110 hours

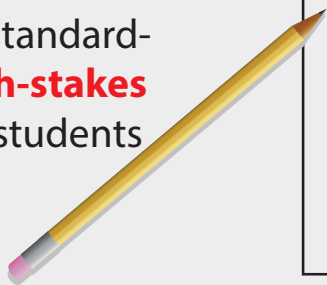

The **Every Student Succeeds Act** gives states and school districts the opportunity to change the high-stakes consequences of standardized tests in Pennsylvania.



Less emphasis on testing prep

More time learning in the classroom

PA students will continue to be tested

Annual testing in grades 3-8 and once in high school **is still required.**

PSSAs

ELA: Grades 3-8
Math: Grades 3-8
Science: 4th & 8th grade

Keystone Exams

End-of-course tests in algebra, biology, and English literature

ACCESS

Assesses English proficiency among English language learners

PASA

For students with disabilities unable to participate meaningfully in the PSSA, even with accommodations

NAEP

Given to a sample of students nationally; known as "The Nation's Report Card"

Other Tests

Other formative, summative, or diagnostic student assessments adopted by an LEA
