The Spring Conference is the most significant training event offered to leaders and members of Southern Region. The registration information is being sent electronically to all Southern Region members, in addition to the leadership, to generate awareness and greater attendance from the membership for this annual training opportunity.

Our conference is held at Liberty Mountain. Since the resort has many training rooms we are able to offer multiple topics that will hopefully pique the interest of many of our members and leaders to want to come and participate in this weekend event. *In addition to our conference, the Southern Region House of Delegates will be held at Liberty Mountain on Friday evening, April 12, 2019.* If you are a delegate and choose to attend the House of Delegates and the Spring Conference, you will need to complete the registration form in this packet for the conference <u>and</u> the House of Delegates registration form that local leaders will receive, so *please contact your president if you wish to attend the House of Delegates.*

We continue to strive to make our training events convenient and accessible to our local leaders and members and try to accommodate a variety of time commitments. While it is certainly suggested that attendance and participation in the full event is most beneficial, it is also understood that some individuals may be unable to commit an entire weekend to this training. Therefore, members may come for the weekend, half of the weekend or just for the day. The bulk of the training sessions are held on Saturday.

Friday evening after dinner will consist of the **Southern Region House of Delegates** for those attending either as a delegate or a guest, and for the rest of the membership, **Staying Safe at Work – How to Plan for Any Situation**. You are strongly encouraged to attend this session if you are not attending the House of Delegates. There will be a social from 9:00 PM – 12:00 AM in the Alpine Room with Dan Speraw as DJ. After Session D on Saturday, there will be games and other fun activities once again. Corn Hole (bean bag toss) will once again be available if you would like to challenge your colleagues or another local in a game. The Saturday evening social will be Board Game Night. Whether you have attended our Spring Conference in the past, or if you are a newcomer, you will be very impressed with the facilities at Liberty Mountain. In addition to the training opportunities, there are many amenities for you to enjoy in the off-training hours, or for your family to enjoy while you are attending training sessions. Some examples

Students home lives are filled with stressors such as poverty, mental illness, substance abuse, trauma, and homelessness. Compounding these problems, many of these conditions overlap in a child's life, such as: poverty and homelessness, mental illness and drug addiction, physical and sexual abuse, along with a myriad of other stressors, each playing a pivotal role in the academic and physical well-being of students attending our public schools.

9) How Arbitrators Think

Aside from being considered a quicker and more economical process than litigation in the courts, arbitration also provides a process where arbitrators are selected based on their differing experience, education, perceived values, and styles of managing the arbitration hearing and explaining their rationale. By reviewing an arbitrator's prior opinions, the parties may examine how an individual arbitrator reasons and attempt to

predict how a case will be decided. Arbitrators bring with them a distinctive approach to the arbitration process and a personal style of decision making and expression. This session will help to familiarize you with the different styles used by arbitrators to reach resolution and axioms of contract interpretation that are used by arbitrators.

10) Bargaining Healthcare Language

The purpose of this presentation is to provide to local affiliates ideal bargaining language as it relates to negotiating healthcare benefits. Items to be discussed include recommended language for the coverage of state-mandated benefits in self-funded plans, language to ensure plans do not charge both copays and deductibles for the same service, and a large number of language items to be addressed at the bargaining table as it relates to both Qualified High Deductible Healthcare Plans (QHDHPs) and Health Savings Accounts (HSAs).

Thanks to the Southern Region Officers, we are proud to be able to offer CARPE (Cadre of <u>A</u>ssociation <u>R</u>ecently-engaged <u>P</u>rofessional <u>E</u>ducators) again this year. CARPE is a Southern Region PSEA initiative aimed at identifying, recruiting and training newly active Association members to become involved at all levels of the Association.

Conference Logistics

Meals will be buffet in the Alpine Room at the Liberty Mountain Resort. The Resort has a liquor license and arrangements have been made for PSEA hospitality time with the usual refreshments at the times shown on the schedule. Friday evening a keg of beer will be provided by the Region Officers. For those staying for the Saturday evening social, two (2) free drink tickets are provided per attendee.

Using the Rt. 30 York St. Exit off 15 South, follow it to the square of Gettysburg. Go ¾ around the square and up to the first light. At the light, make a right onto Rt. 116 West. Continue 10 miles and turn left onto Sanders Road to the Resort.

Registration Procedure

Please make copies as necessary to complete a form for each member attending from your Local Association. <u>Please identify a preferred roommate if double occupancy is selected for each member staying overnight.</u> Room arrangements and costs are based on double occupancy due to greater overnight attendance. If double occupancy is selected, and no roommate is identified, or the roommate cancels/does not register, you will be assigned a roommate from another local. Single room requests will be honored if space permits. Should we need additional hotel rooms, we have secured some rooms at the Sleep Inn a few miles away and members requesting a single room will be moved to the Sleep Inn if necessary.
